

Write Here Write Now creative writing project

Using creative arts to improve literacy levels

Creative arts can stimulate children's imagination and help them bring their ideas to life and provides young people with the confidence to question, to explore, to imagine and to experience which ultimately will have the added benefit of aiding their academic performance.

Each school will identify up to ten Year 3 students that due to low confidence and self-esteem are not reaching their full potential. A Polka Practitioner will work closely within the school by meeting the teachers and students in the Autumn Term to help establish the need and the dynamics of the group. This will enable the Polka Practitioner to tailor-make and prepare a programme of creative activities suited to those students throughout the Spring and Summer Terms.

Each weekly session will consist of a 45-minute practical workshop includes storytelling, role play, improvisations, music & movement plus 30 mins of creating writing to allow the children to recall everything that they have been exploring and include it in their own writing.

Aims of the project

- increase children's creative confidence
- develop pleasure in reading, motivation to read, vocabulary and understanding by encouraging the children to link what they read or hear to their own experiences
- stimulate creativity and imagination, encouraging children to express ideas and opinions and find • ways in which to channel this into their writing
- inspire children not only to read and enjoy listening to stories but to create their own •
- support local schools in raising literacy, language and communication skills

Findings from previous years:

- 96% of children had increased confidence after taking part in the WHWN project •
- Teachers agreed that 96% of children had improved their creativity ideas and imagination .
- Teachers agreed that 90% of children had improved their ability to structure a story or piece of written work
- 85% of children had improved their ability to communicate their ideas

We have noticed an increased level of confidence in all the participants, who contribute more confidently to classroom discussions now, especially in our literacy lessons. They are generally more enthusiastic about writing activities and are finding it easier to organise their ideas. Most of them have exceeded the expected level of progress in reading and writing, which is a wonderful outcome. **Teacher at Poplar Primary School**
